t is a commonly held belief that the affordable housing policy in A major cities like Boston, whose economy is booming, is inadequate to meet the needs of moderate income individuals and middle income families. Developers treat the mandatory affordable unit set aside policy as a necessary nuisance, offering no quality finish to the units they build, no parking and relegate the buyer to the least desirable location in their square box development. As it looks to re-zone South Boston, the City needs to make it clear that high-end luxury condominiums may have their place in Boston, but it is Mayor Marty Walsh's intention to signal to developers that before they CONTINUED ON page 4



"Cardinal, We Never Stop Working In My

Town."^{SOUTH BOSTON TODAY} By Ray Flynn ome of America's leading political thinkers came together for a week in Rome to discuss the life and times of two great world religious leaders: Pope John Paul II and John XXIII. The extraordinary conference was part of the canonization for sainthood of these two declared saints. But the formal presentations were only a small part of the most illuminating and remarkable part of the week. When the day long speeches from scholars, leading political operatives, diplomats and theologians were over, everyone was anxious to keep the discussion going. So we retired to the spacious lobby of the Grand Hotel on Via Veneto to continue with story after story about American politics, the culture, and the current political and economic turmoil in the world.

Most people who were part of our group, already had an intimate knowledge and experience of the early political days when John Paul II was Pope, and a few older ex-Vatican officials and Italian journalists studied who reported on both Angelo Roncalli and Karol Wojtyla's career. We even spoke with members of the Polish Army and resistance who fought the Nazis during World War II. President Reagan's son Michael, Pat Caddell, Newt Gingrich and I must have spoken to 100 people, from friends of John XXIII to priests who met Cardinal Cushing. Five former U.S. Ambassadors to the Vatican spoke to five American Cardinals at yet another reception in Rome.

But the long conversation with former President of Poland and Nobel Peace Prize recipient Lech Walesa, gave us the most insight into the role that Pope John Paul II played

CONTINUED FROM Front Page... overpay for properties, they need to know that middle market and middle class family housing is his top priority.

Residents have made it clear to the Walsh administration at many of the community hearings held during the transition period this past winter that they are in desperate need of relief from the parking crisis and the impact of residential tax increases caused and skewed by the luxury market craze.

The proposal, currently being reviewed by the City, to develop the Gate of Heaven School into luxury housing – which is being met by unanimous opposition by both residents and elected officials – is a perfect example of community frustration and is a high profile test of Mayor Walsh's commitment to his housing agenda. Then along comes the newest example, a proposed upscale 164 unit project at 45 West Third Street, planning only 115 parking spaces and 22 affordable units. The project will occupy the block that is bound by A Street to the West, West 3rd Street to the north, Haul Road to the east, and Athens Street to the south designed as a group of varied style buildings. OFFICIALS ADDRESS CONCERNS REGARDING HUBWAY BIKES


oston City Councilor At-Michael Flaherty Large convened onsite an meeting Friday April 25th to community address concerns about the placement of Hubway bike stations within South Boston. Councilor Flaherty invited Nicole Freedman, Director of Boston Bikes; Kristen McCosh, the Persons with Disabilities Commissioner; City Councilor Bill Linehan, State Senator Linda Dorcena Forry, and State Representative Nick Collins to discuss issues of placement, public safety, and accessibility of the stations. Nicole Freedman has agreed to relocate the West Broadway bike station from the street to the sidewalk



because of safety concerns. This will also restore 3 vital parking spaces to our business district where parking has already posed an issue with residents and patrons.

Furthermore, the City will post signs around the MDC skating rink location notifying visitors that bike riding is prohibited around Castle Island. Nicole Freedman will collaborate with elected officials regarding future placements of Hubway bike stations. Councilor Flaherty and South Boston elected officials will keep the community informed on this matter.

CONTINUED FROM page 4 proposed there is also the issue of the FAR (floor to area ratio). In most South Boston zoning it is a 1 to 1 building to land area ratio. Developers have been asking for 3 to 6 times the ratio and it has been frequently granted. It is expected that any re-zoning proposal will address this often abused aspect.

The reality is that those seeking affordable housing in this market today range from the working poor who have worked very hard to gain middle income status, to those considered middle class such a young professionals, laden with student loans, to young families with both spouses working or with one stay at home parent, to mature family housing needing 3 or more bedrooms, and finally to those characterized as the 'techie' workforce types employed by innovative start-up companies. The demographic profile of affordability is not straightforward anymore.

The current policy in effect from the Menino administration, which has been modified since a 1999 executive order calling for 'inclusionary' zoning, is inadequate not only to deal with the changing demographics, but in also dealing with the Mayor Walsh's campaign commitment to find ways to keep young Boston-educated talent and their families here. Affordable housing and the state of the School System are the two principle elements that will anchor the fulfillment of that commitment.

As reported this week in Bostinno, Mayor Walsh was interviewed by Bloomberg News. In the Bloomberg interview, Mayor Marty Walsh "offered up an intriguing solution to retain Boston's young talent: workforce housing in the form of skyscrapers," DeLuca said. "I'm not afraid to build a skyscraper for workforce housing," the **CONTINUED ON page 7**

REP. COLLINS VOTES COMPREHENSIVE AUTISM LEGISLATION

Representative Nick Collins joined his colleagues in the House of Representatives to pass comprehensive autism legislation that will help foster independence for autistic individuals and provide their families with financial tools for longterm planning.

The bill permanently establishes a state Autism Commission and creates new programs and enhances resources for individuals, families, and education professionals and distinguishes Massachusetts as a national leader. The Autism Commission will be responsible for making recommendations and monitoring the implementation of policies to improve autism care in the Commonwealth.

"This bill helps families of children, adults and elderly relatives with autism to develop long-term financial strategies to prepare for necessary expenses," said Rep. Collins, who sits on the Joint Committee on Children, Families and Persons with Disabilities. "Equally important, this legislation empowers families and individuals throughout their lifetime and helps put Massachusetts at the forefront in supporting its citizens with autism." One provision, known as the ABLE program (Achieving a Better Life Experience), assists families with financial planning for individuals with disabilities by creating taxadvantaged savings accounts to help plan for long-term disability-related expenses. Eligible costs include expenses for education, medical and dental care, job training, housing, transportation, financial management, assistive technology, home improvements and other uses.

The legislation also ensures that as the number of students with autism increases, school districts and teachers are able to provide effective education. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) will develop a training program to help teachers educate those with autism in a manner that is individualized and allows them to stay in classrooms, if appropriate.

The bill will also expand the IQ-based eligibility requirement for adult services provided by the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) so that these services can be effectively extended to those requiring care.

mayor told Bloomberg. "The middle class is being pushed out, and it's happening everywhere." "We have to create workforce housing," he added.

This is an interesting idea, but the housing stock and land availability in certain neighborhoods is not conducive to this vertical approach to housing, not to mention that the targeted 'techies' may not be inclined to put roots down in Boston over the long term, if they don't feel a strong horizontal connection to a neighborhood.

Here are some more realistic recommendations, based on local experience, that make universal sense: private developers of housing of 10 units or more should provide 25% of the units in their development as affordable; eligibility should be for those persons earning 80% to 120% of the area's median income, with the average affordable household income of all the affordable units at 100%; keep affordable units within the proposed development and remaining affordable in perpetuity; affordable units should be at the same quality finish as the market rate units; excessive zoning relief needs to stop; any re-zoning in South Boston, and anywhere in the city for that matter, should include an affordable housing component, missing in the recent First Street re-zoning; parking spaces should be tied to a unit for the use of the person living in the unit and cannot be available for lease unless the inhabitant is carless.

These suggestions run the gamut and need to be crafted into a policy that doesn't constrict development, but sets up a mechanism that meets the Mayor's goals and gives predictability to both the residents and the developer. Mutual respect is necessary to achieve this. The result would be that the many people, who would love to move back to South Boston, and other finding it to their liking, would do so if there were ever true "affordable" middle market housing.

Mayor Walsh is making it a priority and during his inauguration he promised to listen. The only way for him to listen is for the residents to speak up. *So speak up residents.*



Bruins and Habs Meet Again

F or the 34th time in the history of the National Hockey League, the Boston Bruins and the Montreal Canadians, two of the league's most storied franchises, will meet in the postseason.

The two Original Six teams are far from unfamiliar with one another, and the history between the two has been loaded with big hits, big goals, and lots of hate. The last time these two teams met in the postseason was in the first round of the 2010-11 season. That series saw Montreal (46-28-8 in the regular season) take a 2-0 series lead before the Bruins roared back to win four out of five, to take the series in seven games. That series propelled the Bruins (54-19-9) on a Cup run that ended with the Black and Gold hoisting Lord Stanley for the first time since 1972.

Since 1972, the Bruins have won that lone Stanley Cup; the Habs have won seven - but haven't tasted glory since 1993 when a goalie named Patrick Roy was awarded the Conn Smythe Trophy as playoff MVP. This season, the Bruins went 1-2-1 in four games against Montreal. The team that calls the Belle Centre home is a difficult matchup for the Bruins with the amount of speed they can muster against the B's bigger, more physical lineup.

Team USA's Max Pacioretty will lead the charge for the Habs; he scored 39 goals for Montreal in the regular season and netted his first career postseason goal in game four against the Tampa Bay Lightning. Pacioretty's line-mates, David Desharnais and Thomas Vanek, will give the Bruins defense fits, and will likely be the line that Patrice Bergeron will be responsible for stopping.

The first unit for the Habs is certainly a threat, and Thomas Vanek is a Bruins killer; he has 30 goals and 31 assists for a plus-21 rating in 53 career games facing the B's (more than a point per game). The problem that the Habs bring with them this season is their depth - and they have speed to burn through four lines of forwards. The second unit consists of Brandon Prust, Tomas Plekanec, and Brendan Gallagher. Prust is a guy, who is not afraid to drop the gloves, and Brendan Gallagher is currently tied for the team lead in scoring this postseason; he has three goals and two assists in the four games his team has played thus far.

With more speed comes the third unit in Lars Eller, Rene Bourque, and captain Brian Gionta. Bourque was on fire to kick off the postseason, he scored three goals in the series against Tampa Bay, and Lars Eller has wracked up two goals and three assists to compliment his line-mates. The fourth line for the Habs will be Dale Weise, Michael Bournival, and Danny Briere, whom Bruins fans may be familiar with from his time spent with the Philadelphia Flyers. This is a fourth line that can match the intensity that the B's fourth line of Campbell, Thornton, and Paille can bring to the table.

The defensive pairings for the Habs stretch to their fourth defenseman, beyond which point the talent begins to dip. Look for Andrei Markov and Alexei Emelin to be the first pairing on defense, followed by the pair of Josh Gorges and P.K. Subban. Rounding out Montreal's defensive core will be Francis Bouillon and Mike Weaver. The first line will make up the Canadians first power play unit, with P.K. Subban and Andrei Markov quarterbacking from the blue line. The Montreal man-advantage can be lethal; they attack with creativity and speed, and can power the puck through to the net from the blue line. They only converted at 17.2% clip, good for the 19th best power play in the league.

The Bruins power-play will be put to the test after going 6-for-16 (37.5%) against a reeling Detroit penalty kill. Montreal had the fourth best PK in the league during the regular season, killing off 85.1% of all opposing powerplays. Despite the tough PK, the Bruins should have a decisive advantage in the special teams department. The Habs looked good in round one, sweeping the Tampa Bay Lightning out of the playoffs in four games. Montreal got the job done, but also did not have to face Tampa's Vezina-nominated goaltender in Ben Bishop, who was lost to an injury prior to the start of the postseason. The Bruins were workmanlike in round one as well, after dropping game one **CONTINUED ON page 15**







*Every week, we run part of a segment from Danny Picard's daily iTunes podcast, "I'm Just Sayin." He can also be heard weekends on WEEI 93.7 FM. This week, Danny talked Bruins/Canadiens with NHL Insider Jimmy Murphy:

DANNY PICARD: Murph, you're in the Canadiens' dressing room before this series with the Bruins, and they're obviously being asked questions about the Bruins. But with the schedule unknown [as early as Tuesday morning], how is this affecting the players? We know how it's affecting us, and at the end of the day, it won't affect our stories, our sports talk shows, or how we break this down or look at these games. But do you think it's affecting the players' mindset going into this series, that they don't know what the schedule could be [as of Tuesday morning]?

JIMMY MURPHY: Yeah I think it does for sure. And I'll tell you what, I mean, I'm not a big [Montreal Canadiens coach] Michel Therrien fan. I've made that very clear. But I'll give him credit for thinking outside the box [on Monday]. I don't know if you saw what he did, but he held a simulated game day, where the Canadiens basically treated everything like a game day. He had his players go right back into that routine. They showed up to the rink for a gameday skate. They were instructed to go home, take their game day naps, come back, go to the Bell Centre, have their chicken meal that they have before every game, and then they played a scrimmage against the Hamilton Bulldogs. It can't hurt. I think back to what the Olympic teams were doing, USA and Canada. They didn't have the insurance to have the players go on the ice, so they held ball hockey games. Hey, maybe the Bruins should do that. Find a ball hockey rink or an indoor soccer field, or play some ball hockey or something, because you've got to keep that mindset, man. It's all about routine, especially in the playoffs. **DP:** You had a nice piece in The

DP: You had a nice piece in The Boston Herald [on Tuesday] where you

looked back at the 2011 playoff series between the Bruins and Canadiens, and how that one ended in the Bruins' favor. You got some quotes from P.K. Subban. I guess, when you look at that Bruins team and that Canadiens team, and the Bruins/Canadiens teams now, do you give the edge to a different team heading into this series? Who are you giving the edge to, heading into this one?

JM: Well, I mean, if we're looking on paper right now, we're looking in terms of stats and standings. Because Subban said it, this Bruins team right now is better than that Bruins team that beat Montreal in 2011 and went on to win the Stanley Cup. And I agree with him. So I think the Bruins get the edge. I think this Canadiens team that you're going to see, is a lot different than the Canadiens team that you saw [in the regular season]. They were just starting to get to where they are now, when you last saw them, when they went into Boston and won 2-1 in a shootout in late March. They're just starting to get into the form they're in now. And, you know, I've been watching this Canadiens team closely and covering them, and they're able to roll lines like the Bruins. So, they've got a lot more depth than maybe we thought they did at the beginning of the season. And they've got a lot of chemistry going on. But when it comes down to it, if I'm forced to pick, I'm going to pick the Bruins. Because I just think they're the better team overall, and they've got more experience. And I think when it comes down to it, the Bruins end up winning this series in seven games.

DP: And in talking about that 2011 Bruins team, you can say the same things about this Bruins team in 2014. You just mentioned the Canadiens, that they can roll deep with all of their lines. But the Bruins, here they are even with injuries to Chris Kelly and Daniel Paille, and they're still continuing to roll four lines in big spots. One thing you cannot say about [Bruins coach] Claude Julien, you can never say that he doesn't trust everybody on his bench.


JM: It's true. And I think he has an even deeper team this year. One of my colleagues wrote a piece for NHL.com where he was saying the Canadiens are just as deep as the Bruins. I wouldn't go that far. I don't think they're even close to being as deep as the Bruins, when it comes to skill. I think that's just the level [the Canadiens] are playing at right now. And the chemistry and the mindset that they've been in the last month, that's where they're deep. I think a lot of guys right now for the Canadiens are over-achieving, where, I think a lot of guys for the Boston Bruins right now are just doing what they should do, based on their skill and their stats. So, I think the Bruins are a deeper team when it comes down to it. DP: If you lined them up against a wall, and you had to pick one goalie for one game, who would it be, Tuukka Rask or Carey Price?

JM: That's too much of a choice, man. I mean, if you look at Carey Price, and just the way he -- and I know he had a superstar team in front of him at the Olympics. But still, he was lights out when the other teams did get their chances. And I thought he was amazing in that game against USA. But, overall body of work, and just what Tuukka's done this year. And also, I think what Tuukka's been through since 2011, I think I'd have to go with Tuukka. I don't think Price has experienced enough playoff hockey, compared to Tuukka Rask since 2011. And Price has only got past the first round now twice in his career as a starting goalie, because it was Jaroslav Halak who

took them on that run in 2010. So in terms of playoff experience and you've got a Game 7, do-or-die, I've got to go with Tuukka Rask.

DP: Yeah, I'd go with Tuukka as well. The things that he's dealt with in the past. He was the Bruins' goalie the year before they won the Cup, where they blew a 3-0 series lead to the Flyers. That was on Tuukka. And I think last year we were wondering if Tuukka could even get out of the East, could he even be a guy to get them past the second round. He took them to the Stanley Cup Final, and we know how that ended last year, not the way they wanted it to, obviously. But here they are trying to get back to the Cup Final, and I would take Tuukka Rask over Carey Price, if I had to line them up against a wall and pick one for a big game. When we line these two teams up going into this series. What people were saying with the Bruins and Red Wings series was, hey, the Bruins are the more physical team but the Red Wings had skill, speed, and finesse. I think one thing that got lost in the conversation was, the Bruins also have a lot of speed and have a lot of skill to go along with the physicality. And that should be recognized going into this series with the skilled Canadiens.

JM: It's interesting you bring that up, because I'm writing a little preview of the series for TSN, and I was just trying to transcribe some quotes. I talked to [Canadiens forward] Travis Moen a couple days ago, and I brought that up to him, that, everyone is talking about the Bruins' depth and all you ever hear up here [in Montreal] is how physical the Bruins are, the big, bad Bruins. But I asked him, I said, "Am I crazy to say that they're a fast team too?" And he said, "No, not at all." And he said, "You know what, one guy that's fast and nobody gives him



credit for it is Milan Lucic." He goes, "When that guy gets his wheels going, man, you get out of the way or you're getting run over. He's like a runaway freight train." He gave the Bruins a lot of credit for their speed. And I haven't heard many players say that before.

DP: I'm going to pick the Bruins to win this one in six games, Murph. I just think that this Bruins team, even if you have to keep going with Florek and Caron in the lineup, I think that Tuukka is just locked in. I love what I see from Dougie Hamilton in the defensive zone. I'm higher on this Bruins team this year, than I was last year's team. And I think that's saying a lot, because last year was a pretty damn good team as we know, even though they didn't get the ultimate prize. So I'm going to say Bruins in six games. But let's say I'm wrong, and the Canadiens win, what would be the storyline? How can the Canadiens somehow prove me wrong and win this series? I think we'd be talking about the Canadiens power play dominating the series, and making the Bruins penalty kill look pedestrian. If the Canadiens prove me wrong, what would the storyline be? JM: I think it would be the Canadiens distracting the Bruins away from their game plan and making the Bruins forget the task at hand and be more worried about pounding some guys into oblivion. I think the other storyline is, I don't think the Canadiens -- statwise or skill-wise -- are as deep as the Bruins, but I think they're playing as deep as the Bruins right now. They're playing bigger than they are. They're playing better than maybe they are. There's a thing with this Canadiens team that everyone says up here, and it's that, a lot of times the Canadiens in

to Detroit, Boston ousted the Red Wings by winning four straight.

This series can be broken down by match-ups, and it's safe to say that both teams bring very different styles to the table. Odds are the team that dictates the pace of play will be the team with the overall advantage in the round two playoff matchup. On paper, the Bruins still have more depth, but the real battle will be played between the pipes. Carey Price and Tuukka Rask are both Olympians, two of the best goalies in the world - this series could very well come down to which goalie can come up with the big save at the right time. Both are entirely capable of stealing a series for their respective teams. One thing is certain, when the Bruins and the Habs meet, blood begins to boil - and with the two teams meeting in the postseason, the bad blood only intensifies. Both teams will have time to rest prior to the start of round two as the remainder of the NHL wraps up round one. When the series kicks off, both teams will be fresh, play will be fast, furious, and physical - and the hate will be palpable.

the past would get a 2-0 lead and then they'd collapse and they'd lose. It's the other way around now, where, if they have that lead, they hold on, they find a way to keep the momentum if the other team starts to come back. And now, if they're the team losing 2-0, they come back. There's a resilient Canadiens team that I think wasn't there before. And I think that could be a factor.
