


A Test Of Wills Or A Test Of A Contract

Boston Police Commissioner William Evans testified Tuesday that he has the power to assign body cameras to a group of officers after none volunteered to wear them, but union officials insisted that such a move would violate a recent agreement with the city.

"I think it is my lawful authority as a police commissioner," Police Commissioner William B. Evans said at a hearing in Suffolk Superior Court on a lawsuit filed by the Boston Police Patrolmen's Association to delay the

Paltry turnout seen for rare Thursday primary

Fewer than 20 percent of Massachusetts registered voters are expected to turn out and cast ballots on Thursday in the state's primary elections, Jessica Trufant of the Patriot Ledger reports. Although there are numerous contested races across the state—including some bizarre ballot lineups on the South Shore and heavily contested sheriff's races in Hampden and Essex county—the fact that the election is being held on a Thursday is expected to help depress turnout. "People are used to Tuesday traditionally being an election day, so having it on a Thursday will add confusion," UMass Boston political science professor Paul Watanabe tells the Patriot Ledger.

Spoiler alert: The Johnson-Weld ticket is polling rather well

They're not going to win the presidential election, but the Libertarian ticket of former New Mexico Gov. Gary Johnson and former Massachusetts Gov. Bill Weld seem poised to serve as potential spoilers in the race, with the duo polling at 8 percent, according to the most recent Franklin Pierce/Boston Herald survey. They're obviously gaining traction because of widespread voter discontent with GOP presidential nominee Donald Trump and Democratic nominee Hillary Clinton, who holds only a slim 3 percent edge over Trump, despite his recent bombastic stumbles, according to the same poll, reports the Herald's Joe Battenfeld. We have our doubts

about whether the national race is really so close between Clinton and Trump, particularly after you break down polling results in key swing states. But there's no doubt about widespread voter discontent this year.

U.S. Sen. Elizabeth Warren is absolutely right to demand more information from Donald Trump about a whole host of issues, including his shady business dealings over the decades and his failure to release his tax returns. But just when Trump is thrown on the defensive (again), along comes another revelation about Hillary Clinton, whether it's about her emails or the Clinton family's foundation fundraising, etc. etc. This morning, the Washington Post reports that a for-profit college signed Bill Clinton, the former president, to a "lucrative deal as a consultant and 'honorary chancellor,' paying him \$17.6 million over five years until the contract ended in 2015 as Hillary Clinton launched her campaign for president." And, yes, there is a State Department fundraising angle to the story. Hillary Clinton should be pulling away with this election and yet?

Warren readies veto list of Clinton appointees

Assuming Clinton wins in November, Sen. Elizabeth Warren and her allies are said to be preparing a list of would-be appointees they would seek to block in a would-be Hillary Clinton administration, Patrick Temple-West reports in Politico.

Some Warren allies have found their way onto the Clinton transition team but tension remains among various factions within the Democratic party and Warren is signaling she will use her sway in the Senate to fight appointees she sees as too cozy with Wall Street or big banks.

Walsh: Privatizing T bus drivers

is a 'dangerous way to go'

Marty Walsh, a former union boss before becoming mayor of Boston, is hitting the brakes on preliminary talks of possibly privatizing MBTA bus and maintenance operations as a way for the cash-strapped agency to save money, the Herald's Matt Stout reports. "It's a slippery slope. It's a dangerous way to go," Walsh said vesterday after speaking at the Greater Boston Labor Council's annual Labor Day breakfast. "When you talk about privatization, in an initial contract, it always seems like it's going to save money. Long-term it doesn't save money; the costs go up. I've had some conversations with the governor about this. ... I think it's a mistake. Privatizing the whole MBTA is not the way to go."

Walsh's reaction came after the Herald's Stout reported over the holiday weekend that the T's control board is seriously considering plans to privatize bus and maintenance services that now employ more than 1,700 full- and part-time bus drivers and 390 machinists. The Herald reports the idea was contained in a 17-page report sent to lawmakers late last week, usually a good time to dump controversial news heading into a weekend, let alone a long holiday weekend.

ReadingBetween The Lines

he day began outside St. Patrick's Cathedral. Standing among hundreds of uniformed men and women, some police, mostly fire fighters, unable to fit into the Cathedral, we all came to attention to the strains of bagpipes. The massive doors opened and yet another widow. This one pregnant, surrounded by her children, emerged to say, her final goodbye to her firefighter husband.

Along with Police Officer Jackie Loan, we had arrived by Amtrak that morning to pay our respects and offer whatever comfort we could. Within a couple of blocks of Ground Zero, the streets are blocked off. At one of these blockades, after identifying ourselves, 4 or 5 of us were escorted to Ground Zero. As a police officer who has worked in Washington, D.C. and Boston, I have seen my share of horrific crime scenes. But no words or pictures could express or convey what I saw or felt. Nothing could prepare me.

For a Bostonian, I try to imagine the area from Columbus Ave. to Boylston and from Berkeley to Mass. Ave. Then take all those buildings, both Hancock buildings, to Westin and Copley hotels, the Copley Library, the Prudential and Hynes Auditorium. Smash and knock them down. Then burn them so they are charred and melted. That's a mild description of the devastation. A detective took Jackie and myself to the lip of "The Pit". The seven stories of South Tower debris have been removed down to street level, and about 4-5 stories of basement has been excavated, creating this pit. Without the two massive towers, the sharp but weak afternoon early winter sun – lights up the work area. It is however, unable to penetrate this pit. The contrast makes it seem as though you are looking into a black, bottomless hole. Everything and everyone has a grayness to them. A light wispy smoke fills the air.

As we look down into this hell, a bull dozer moves against a pile, of debris, releasing a thick billowing cloud of grav-black smoke. At its center a muted orange glow. The workers, moving far below, look like some otherworld creatures with their respirators and hardhats as they pass the broken stumps of support columns. Looking for all the world like rotted trees broken off.

We exit back on to the scene and now no sun penetrates the site. Everything is gray and colorless. We talk to Officer Carl Ludwig, who appears like a gray ghost from next to a plywood-covered storefront. He tells us everyone is working 14 hour shifts. During the first days, he says, they were stretched so thin, Police Officers from Miami, Texas and Tennessee were taking radio calls and walking beats on Broadway.

We are beginning to feel the effects of breathing the foul air and wonder if Officer Ludwig's paper dust mask is doing any good. Det. Bobby Murray pulls up in a golf cart and offers us a lift. The carts are needed to cover the vast distances of destruction. Detectives have to be present whenever remains are removed. We discuss the police officer recovered that morning. He points out the "winter garden," sort of a glass atrium between the two towers. He tells us a fire chief, running for the safety of the "garden", was buried by the collapse, just 10 feet from his goal. "We'll look for him next," he tells us. After that they'll look for 3 ESU (Emergency Service Unit) cops. Six of them were running for their lives when the floor collapsed. Three lived. We then got a ride to police headquarters. A trip through New York traffic in a golf cart could be its own story! Steel barricades, cops at the doors with machine guns. Quite an atmosphere.

As Jack and I made our way from Police Plaza to Penn Station, we began to notice something we had overlooked during the depressing day. We talked to cops on beat, street venders, people om the train coming home from work and finally, at Houlihan's Bar inside Penn Station, a cook. The sorrow was still there, just below the surface. But as they told us our stories of how they had experienced September 11, the sense of courage and determination in them just shone right through. They were actually thanking us for coming down there from "Bawston." Complete strangers coming up to us. It was amazing.

Anyone who has any doubts of the rightness of our military action, let them come to New York. Anyone who doubts we have to fight this fight, wherever it goes, however long it takes, to protect our future, let them come to New York. Anyone who had doubts of the American spirit and its determination to defend its way of life, let them come to New York.

Among this session's important achievements:

- We passed a landmark energy bill that will diversify the state's portfolio, save ratepayers money, increase our usage of clean energy and require upgrades to our aging infrastructure;

- Increased the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) without implementing new taxes or fees. For low-to-moderate households, EITC rose to 23 percent in January, 2016. Increasing this credit is an effective way to fight stagnant wages and lift working families out of poverty.

It remains an honor for me to represent you and the 4th Suffolk District in the Massachusetts House of Representatives. It's a seat I am proud to hold and I look forward to serving another term as we seek to improve the quality of life for all of us in the district and everyone across the Commonwealth.


Baker joins forces with those opposing economic boycotts of Israel

body camera program.

Pressure is mounting on Mayor Walsh and the Commissioner, as this issue has become a national movement by body camera advocates and activists on one side and police departments and officers on the other side. The basis for the activism is transparency and accountability. The basis for police concern is law and order. As has been proven in the past, on camera action does not display the prelude to the incident or situation, which may change the impression of the recorded incident.

Add to this, the move to require 100 officers to use the devices, after a voluntary effort failed, and the police union invokes their contract. A deal was forged in July, but Patrick Rose, president of the largest police union in Boston, has said that he did not want officers to volunteer without an agreement. His further concern has to do with privacy issues that should apply to police as citizens as well as everyone else. Local residents echoed that sentiment stating in the past that he felt that the

use of a camera is a potential violation of the police officer's privacy and that it is a band-aid for a really deeper problem".

At the heart of the initial delay was a union demand that officers be able to view video footage before making written statements and other reports, an issue that civil rights activists and civic leaders oppose. The pilot policy allows for officers to review the footage before making a report.

Evans said, as an example of its usefulness, that video footage from nearby businesses helped prevent public unrest after three recent police-involved shootings by showing why officers opened fire.

Evans said he was initially lukewarm to body cameras, but now sees the value in them. It is what the public wants, he added. Commissioner Evans has said he eventually wants to have a permanent camera program. At least one officer did volunteer, Rose said, adding that the city did not do enough to educate officers about the program. Both sides said they did not anticipate the lack of volunteers for the six-month program, which aims to have 100 officers participate.

The Port of Boston is thriving. Boston's 6th largest employer with more than 7,000 direct jobs contributes \$4.6 billion annually to the Massachusetts economy. In 2015, Conley Container Terminal received a national Breathe Easy Leadership Award for reducing harmful diesel emissions beyond what is required by law, and promoting clean transportation in the Northeast. Particulate matter at the Conley Terminal has declined 20% since 2011.

Clean trucks We replaced 60 old drayage trucks with clean diesel trucks at a cost of \$3 million funded by Massport, truck owners

and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). As a result, nitrogen oxides, particulate matter, hydrocarbons, and carbon monoxide have all been significantly reduced.

Clean cranes We're using EPA funding to retrofit five diesel-powered rubber tire gantry cranes used to load and unload trucks and reposition containers within the yard at Conley Container Terminal. The retrofitted cranes will conserve fuel, reduce noise and significantly reduce emissions.

Dedicated freight corridor We're investing \$75 million to create the Thomas Butler Freight Corridor which will eliminate 400-500 trucks through the neighborhood each day, create a sound barrier, and a 4.5 acre Memorial Park.


