At the wake, as many lingered to share stories of the experiences they had over the years with Brian, there was no lack of praise for all he has done on behalf of the people; his friends and neighbors that he cared so much about and the help he was always so ready to give when needed.

Saturday morning, the Gate of Heaven Church filled up quickly as hundreds turned out to say their final goodbyes, say a prayer for him and his family and to once again console Brian's wife Kelly, his son Brian Jr. and all the other relatives still in a state of disbelief.

The Eulogy was given by young Brian. It was articulate and brilliantly done. It brought both tears and smiles to the crowd, as he spoke glowingly of his dad who was such a positive influence in his life. Before the long line of cars departed for the cemetery, at the family's request, the procession took that final ride down to Castle Island with police escort, before carrying Brian Mahoney to his final resting place.

Brian Mahoney was considered one of a kind by those who knew him. He epitomized the true neighborhood crusader, always there to defend and assist his beloved South Boston and all those who resided here. He was outspoken and well spoken, tough yet compassionate and would do anything for anyone who asked. His work for local veteran's causes was legendary and the people he helped over the years, from the very young to the very old are too numerous to count.

He will be missed and remembered as a neighborhood hero and a true son of South Boston in an era when there are just not enough of them to go around. But most of all, he will be remembered as a man – a good man who made a difference in the most positive of ways. Rest in Peace Brian Mahoney. And may you continue to watch over South Boston from Heaven above.

Spread Cheer, Not Invasive Hungry Pests, This Holiday Season A Few Simple Actions Can Help Protect America's Trees & Plants

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23, 2016 - The December holiday season is the greatest gift-giving time of the year, and can be a vulnerable time for spreading dangerous, invasive Hungry Pests. These pests can travel across borders, continents and oceans with human assistance. They hitchhike in or on plants, produce or food brought in as gifts from friends and families. Or they can hide in or on firewood brought from another location to light a holiday fire. As such, USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) is asking the public to help safeguard the nation's trees and plants by taking a few simple actions.

"By following a few simple steps this holiday season, consumers can help protect the food on our nation's tables and prevent billions of dollars' worth of damage to our country's crops and forests," said USDA APHIS Deputy Administrator Osama El-Lissy. "Although it's winter, invasive pests are still at work. It doesn't take much to stop these Hungry Pests from spreading, and the benefits are enormous."

Here are some ways the public can help protect the holidays from Hungry Pests:

Ordering Online: Poinsettias and amaryllis make festive gifts, but be careful when ordering any plant online. To spread holiday cheer instead of invasive pests, only buy or order plants from reputable vendors that comply with federal quarantine restrictions. To be safe, ask the grower if they are aware of and abide by all USDA regulations for that particular plant.

Christmas Trees, Wreaths &

Greens: When buying your Christmas tree, deck the halls with greens and holly, but be sure to buy them from trusted sources. Established retailers make sure their suppliers follow federal quarantine restrictions that prevent

invasive pests from hitchhiking on Christmas trees and decorations.


Moving Firewood: For a safe and cozy yuletide fire, buy firewood where you plan to burn it. If burning your own firewood, don't move it off your property or you may spread invasive tree killers like the emerald ash borer and Asian longhorned beetle. Instead, buy or responsibly gather firewood near the place you'll burn it. Or take certified, heat-treated firewood with you instead.

International Travel: Traveling abroad for the holidays? Declare all agricultural items to customs officials upon your return or you may bring back more than memories. In addition to fresh produce, declare all spices, grains and packaged foods, which could carry the destructive Khapra beetle. Visit www.DontPackaPest. com, a website sponsored by USDA and several partner agencies, to learn what is safe to bring back and other valuable travel tips.

International Gift-Giving:

International customs are fun to keep, but be careful not to send or accept greenery, seeds, trees or plants, including citrus, across borders. Citrus greening, citrus canker and other devastating diseases are spread by the movement of infected plants. This includes items made with citrus, such as floral arrangements, wreaths, potpourri or seasonings like kaffir lime leaves. Most international items can be found in the United States, so discourage family and friends from sending them and buy them here instead.


Combining efforts with the Massachusetts State Police, who are organizing local Toys for Tots collections, the firefighters at Ladder 19 and Engine 39, Ladder 18 have joined this effort and will hopefully collect enough donated new toys to help bring a Merry Christmas to even more children who otherwise may not be receiving gifts this season. The State Police Barracks on Day Blvd in South Boston, the Old Colony Division is a major drop of location. And the good thing is, it will be convenient for anyone wanting to donate as both Ladder 19 and The Old Colony Barracks are open 24 hours a day to receive the toys.

What the Toys for Tots organizers are requesting is that all toys donated

be new, unwrapped and in their original packaging. The deadline to donate the toys at both these location is December 16th. The reason for the deadline is to give the organizers time to prepare to separate and pack them and make sure all are delivered on time just before Christmas.



DENVER BRONCOS (-5) over Jacksonville Jaguars

-If the playoffs began after Week 12, the 7-4 Denver Broncos would be on the outside looking in, thanks to Sunday night's overtime loss to the Kansas City Chiefs in Denver. There's still hope for the Broncos, who are fighting to be the third AFC West team to advance to the playoffs.
