CITY OF BOSTON REMINDS RESIDENTS OF MARIJUANA REGULATIONS

n Thursday December 15
2016, the Commonwealth
of Massachusetts will
recognize marijuana as a legal substance for adults 21 and over, and
the City of Boston reminds residents of the following rules and
standards that are to be enacted
with the new law:

Possession of Marijuana

- Adults may carry up to one ounce of marijuana in public. Five grams of that may be a marijuana concentrate.

Marijunana Continued from front page

- Adults cannot have more than ten ounces of marijuana in their residence.

Growing Marijuana

- Each resident in the state can grow up to six plants, but there can be no more than 12 plants in a household. Adults must grow plants in their primary residence in a locked or secured location.

- Plants cannot be visible from a public space without the use of binoculars, an aircraft or other visual aids.

Medical Marijuana

- The new law will not affect medical marijuana.

Smoking in Boston

- Residents and visitors cannot smoke in public parks in Boston. This includes marijuana and tobacco.
- -"No smoking" means residents cannot inhale, exhale, burn or carry any:

- lighted cigar, cigarette, or pipe,
- lighted or vaporized substance in any manner or form.
- This includes marijuana, even if it's used for medical reasons

Additional Restrictions

- The marijuana law prevents adults from consuming marijuana in a public place where smoking tobacco is prohibited. The law allows for a fine of up to \$100 for each offense.

- Under the law, "marijuana products" include:
- edible products and beverages
- topical products and ointments, and
- oils and tinctures.
- Under the law, resident cannot have an open container of marijuana or marijuana products in their motor vehicle. Offenders can be fined up to \$500 for each offense.
- "Open container" means a package of marijuana

or marijuana products with a broken seal, or with some of the contents removed. Residents must keep an open container in a locked glove compartment or trunk.

- The new law doesn't change the existing state laws for operating a vehicle under the influence of marijuana. It's still illegal, and subject to the same fines and penalties.



Lynch: While Dems discussed bathrooms, Trump talked jobs

U.S. Rep. Stephen Lynch, D-South Boston, thinks Donald Trump won the election partly because his campaign did a better job than Hillary Clinton's in addressing the concerns of the average American worker, reports WBZ News at CBS Boston. And what were Dems doing? "We were talking about which bathroom to use, we're talking about freerange chicken, all these other issues out there, GMOs, that I don't think really affect in the short term what Americans worry about most on Election Day," Lynch said on Keller at Large on Sunday.

Former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney last night conceded on his Facebook page that he wasn't going to get the Secretary of State job under President-elect Donald Trump, who instead is going with one of the more unlikely cabinet picks in recent memory: Rex Tillerson, CEO of ExxonMobil. Tillerson is likely to face tough confirmation hearings due to his close corporate ties to Russia, the Washington Post is reporting. In his Facebook post, Romney writes: "It was an honor to have been considered for Secretary of State of our great country. My discussions with President-elect Trump have been both enjoyable

and enlightening. I have very high hopes that the new administration will lead the nation to greater strength, prosperity and peace."

Keating: 'We were under attack'

Over the weekend it was U.S. Rep. Seth Moulton warning that Russia is an 'enemy' of the United States. Yesterday, U.S. Rep. Bill Keating, a member of the House Homeland Security Committee, was saying that the U.S. was 'under attack' by apparent Russian hackers determined to influence the recent presidential election and that he supports an investigation, the Herald is reporting. Meanwhile, some presidential electors are demanding that they be briefed on the investigation into Russia's cyber antics, in a move supported by Hillary Clinton's campaign, reports Politico.

No matter, Healey won't be testifying today in a Dallas courtroom over her climatechange investigation of ExxonMobil and Trump will likely be trumpeting Rex's appointment later today. 
Report: Higher-education funding cut by 14 percent since 2001

From State House News Service's Katie Lannan: "Massachusetts has cut its higher education funding by an inflation-adjusted 14 percent since 2001, as both tuition and fees and student debt have increased, a new report found. The declining support for the University of Massachusetts system, four-year state universities and two-year community colleges comes amidst 'growing importance' of public higher education to the state's long-term health, according to the report, released Tuesday by the Massachusetts Budget and Policy Center."

SEN. FORRY, REP. COLLINS APPLAUD MBTA INVESTMENTS

\$280 Million for New Red Line Cars

Forry and State Representative Nick Collins lauded the MBTA's decision to invest additional money into a complete overhaul of Red Line trains. Previously under contract to replace only a portion of the aging train cars, the MBTA Fiscal Management and Control Board voted unanimously to instead replace the entire fleet, and add up to an additional 30 cars, bringing the total from 220 to 252 cars. The cars are expected to be in use by 2023.

"The investment in new Red Line trains will significantly improve efficiency and reliability for all commuters, in particular my neighbors in Dorchester, South Boston and Mattapan," said Senator Linda Dorcena Forry. "I commend the MBTA for taking steps to modernize the system and improve the service for riders."

The Red Line is the system's busiest branch, carrying up to 22 percent of the total riders and servicing Cambridge, Downtown, South Boston, Dorchester, Quincy, and Braintree. The new cars are expected to cost an additional \$280 million, but reduce the cost by up to \$310,000 per car. In addition, the new fleet is expected to reduce time between trains from five minutes, to three minutes, increasing efficiency, reliability, and service for riders, some of the main goals of the lawmakers' transportation agenda.

"This is an important step forward for the system, and one that will greatly enhance the quality of life for commuters in South Boston and Dorchester" said Representative Collins. "I applaud the MBTA's decision to make such an important investment to bring in new riders and to provide the best possible service to all its customers. The Red Line is a key transit corridor that keeps our city and our region thriving, and this sort of investment will ensure that it will be a reliable connection for residents, businesses, and commuters for years to come."

They will have their work cut out for them given the high bar set by this year's Red Kettle Campaign Chair, Jay Ash, Massachusetts' Secretary for Housing and Economic Development. Ash and his wife, Susan, contributed to the campaign, and Susan's company matched the couple's \$300 donation at The Salvation Army Red Kettle Kickoff last month. Red Kettle corporate partner, Star Market, immediately offered to match the Ashes' gift – resulting in an impressive total of \$1,200.

The Red Kettles are a vital source of funding for Salvation Army programming and services for hundreds of thousands of children, families and seniors across Massachusetts each year. This includes meals, toys and other holiday support for those in need, along with funding for food

World WarII veteran and South Bostonian, Ed Hamilton returned home this week from his most recent visit to Hawaii. Ed was invited back to help mark the 75th Anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor. He travelled to the islands with family members and was not only an invitee, but an honored guest as well.

He was a speaker at a local Hawaiian grade school, the Mokulele Elementary School and thrilled the young students with his presentation and his knowledge of those historical WWII events. He was even selected to light the official Christmas tree while there. He was honored by the famous Outrigger Hotel as well. Ed was given the title of Honorary Grand Marshall of the Pearl Harbor Day Parade. He joined 150 other WWII veterans and Pearl Harbor survivors, who were honored everywhere they went on the island. At almost every stop, people would come up to these vets and shake their hands and thank them for their service. In restaurants, the establishment owners and even other diners picked up the dinner tabs for them. The respect and gratitude that was shown each and every one of them was truly heartwarming.

As many Americans are aware, the Hollywood actor Gary Sinise has been active in quite a few veterans' causes. He travels to different bases and visits wounded vets in hospitals and gives most generously, where ever there is

a need to help out America's heroes. Mr. Sinise spent time with Ed Hamilton and it was apparent that they enjoyed each other's company.

As most know, Ed was in at least two major battles in the Pacific Theatre during that war and saw plenty of action during his time in the service. As he travelled around the island with his fellow WWII veterans, the bonds that they all shared during that conflict were just as strong now as they were then. Ed Hamilton was reunited with many other surviving WWII veterans, most of whom also travelled great distances to get there for what was a true reunion of American heroes.

Once again, South Boston's own Ed Hamilton was a welcomed visiting dignitary by the United States Navy where he served honorably during dangerous times. It was clear by the reception he received where ever he went on this and past visits to Pearl Harbor that his service, like every veteran's service is very much appreciated by members of today's military as well. 












Students are working on Writing through the Year Unit 1. This unit introduces students to the world of writing. Kindergarten 1 teacher, Ms. Erin Sawyer, creates an environment where students' efforts and approximations are encouraged and applauded. She masterfully ensures that students feel safe in their abilities to take risks as

they embark on their writing journey. The tone Ms. Sawyer sets on this first unit will lay the foundation for future units. As Ms. Sawyer says: "It is okay to make mistakes and my only expectation is that they try their best. My students truly love writer's workshop and they write daily. They get very excited when having the opportunity to sit in the author's chair and share their writing piece in front of the class during 'sharing'."


Literacy work continues and is currently focused on beginning and end sounds. Students are having a lot of fun building words and sentences together in circle time. The writing desk is very busy in the mornings, there are a lot of independent writers in K1!

Students have progressed to

Literacy Component Domain 3: Animals. The K1 children are very enthusiastic about this domain, especially about the animal hospital in the dramatic play center. Syllable blending and segmentation, sequencing and narrative storytelling, fine motor skills and handwriting strokes and initial sound identification are particular skill areas addressed in domain 3.

K1 students have moved onto Math Module 2 and are learning about 3 dimensional shapes. The children are identifying, analyzing, sorting, comparing and building with solid shapes. Students will continue to deepen their learning on patterns, greater/ less than, measurement, ten frames and adding. Then, of course, students will take all their knowledge and BUZZ right into an exciting STEM project!
