### Baker's DACA burden: Opposing Trump, once again

Gov. Charlie Baker has been put in the politically uncomfortable position, once again, of having to distance himself from a policy move by his own party's president, this time Republican President Donald Trump's plan to eliminate the Deferred Action For Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program. "Well I'm hoping the president doesn't repeal the DACA program, I'm hoping that he continues the DACA program," said Baker, as reported at CBS Boston. 

# The Wine Guy Argentina's Red Standard



ne of today's fastest-growing wines, as anyone who drinks red wine might guess, is Malbec. As well, if you drink it, chances are that most of you that do have only had it from one country- Argentina. Arguably, that's understandable, as Malbec represents over 30% of the country's annual wine production. What you might not know is that it's not a wine that's native to Argentina, not even to South America and that, for hundreds of years, it wasn't even made to be had by itself.

Today, I'd like to give you a broader picture of this great red's origins, all the places it comes from today and where you might see it in the future.

The grape is French in origin and today, can still be found in both the Bordeaux region, where it has been a "workhorse", or blending grape, used in small amounts to "top off" wine from many of the region's world-famous wines. It's also grown in the Cahors region in France's southwest and until recently, was consumed almost entirely within the country.

In the 1850's, a group of Argentinian winemakers came to Europe, looking to increase plantings in the Mendoza region, located in the foothills of the Andes. A local consultant suggested Malbec and it was brought back to the country. The hotter, drier climate, along with the higher elevation, caused the grape to thrive far more that it did in France and for over 100 years, it was the wine of choice for both Argentina and many other South American regions. Then, in the early 2000s, economies around the world began to see trouble, which caused prices to rise, including the price of wine made in Europe and the U.S. Many Americans started seeking an affordable, delicious alternative and thus, it's time had arrived.

One of the most popular Malbecs in the US market today is Bodega Norton Malbec Reserva, 2015, Argentina, (\$14.99), a perennial crowd-pleaser, this particular Malbec shows mesmerizing inky blues and purples in the glass, with loads of dark fruit and cigar box spice on the nose. Ready to roll with red cherry, black plum, and serious spice swirled with earthy, herbal character and well-integrated tannins, this Malbec offers considerable interest for the money. Try it with any roasted or grilled red meat, as well as Lamb or Beef bourguignon.

Another popular and available wine is Kaiken Ultra Malbec, 2015 Argentina, (\$18.99). This full-throttle Malbec from the heart of Mendoza's winemaking epicenter, is made by famous Chilean winemaker, Aurelio Montes of Montes Wines. Black fruit, dark chocolate, and espresso aromas all combine on the nose, while blackberry, blueberry, and vanilla notes dance on the palate. Full-bodied, full-throttle and a big, juicy finish make this a Malbec to track down for sipping now or cellaring a few years.

Getting back to France, the Cahors region was given new life in the 1990's, when many of the top names from Bordeaux bought up many of the region's vineyards and transformed them. One of the best examples of this "new generation" of Malbec is Chateau Lamartine, Cahors, 2014, (\$19.99). Made of 90% Malbec, with a soupçon of Merlot

for finesse, this French version is definitely more structured. Deep, rich and bold, its black fruit, tobacco, graphite and earth tones give it a distinctively different nose than the Argentinian variety, while subtle oak notes, soft tannins and suitable grip will hold your interest. This French-accented Malbec offers a different tone that you'll surely rememberdevilish, more mysterious, and really pleasing to the curious palate.

In Argentina's Mendoza region, the Cuyo area, though relatively small, produces some of the country's ripest, most intense wines.

Tikal Patriota, Mendoza, Cuyo, 2012, (\$19.99), is the embodiment of all that makes this place special. It's not only a Wine Spectator "Top 100 Wines" selection; it's been given 91 points by Robert Parker-no small feat! It presents a deep reddish purple with aromas of bright berry/cherry fruit and gives the impression of swallowing a whole bowl of mixed ripe berries at once. Big body, yet very balanced, with luscious layers of raspberry, cherry, and cocoa flavors. Just a hint of baking spice at the end brings it all together. This one is a natural with Prime Rib, bone-in, some yorkshire pudding and your favorite roasted vegetables. Enjoy! Ask the Wine Guy at jdris8888@gmail.com

place with color guard, the raising of the colors, salutes to the fallen, guest speakers and so much more.

This year's special guest speaker will be General George Casey, US Army Chief of Staff—Retired. General Casey is a native of Hyde Park, Massachusetts. Rededication 2017 will be dedicated to the memories of South Boston's 3 Medal of Honor recipients. They are PVT. George H. Nee, PVT. Frank O. Walker and PFC. Michael J. Perkins. Their family members have been invited to the ceremony and will be recognized from the podium. Other special guests will be Medal of Honor recipients Tom Kelley and Ryan Pitts.

Among the elected officials that will be present will be Mayor Marty Walsh and Governor Charlie Baker.

Thirty-six years ago, a group of South Boston's Vietnam veterans made a promise to each other and to this community that they would forever honor the members of this neighborhood's 25 Vietnam veterans, who lost their lives in the line of duty in that war in defense of our country's freedom. They have been ever faithful in keeping that promise with the building of the South Boston Vietnam Memorial,

the nation's very first, and the rededication memorial ceremonies that have followed each and every year, since the monument was first dedicated.

Look closely at the photo accompanying this story. It was taken in 1982 when 55 South Boston Vietnam veterans made the trip to Washington DC to take part in the dedication of the nation's national Vietnam War Memorial. Washington was so impressed with the efforts of the South Boston Contingent that built the first in the country memorial dedicated to that war's fallen, that they gave them a place of honor in the line of march that day in DC. The Southie vets easily stood out among the crowd as they were the only group to be dressed in suits and ties with red carnations as the groups of vets from the rest of the country wore camouflage.

SBT asked South Boston Vietnam Memorial Committee Chairman Tom Lyons why the Southie group chose to dress in suits during on that day in DC, when so many others did not. The following was his reply: "We wanted to set the tone and show the public that this is who Vietnam veterans were. It was a time when the memory of that war still wasn't popular among some segments of the population. We were there to show the public that we were everyday citizens that were proud Americans and honored

to have served in Vietnam in defense of our nation."

Chairman Tom Lyons and the entire membership of The South Boston Vietnam Memorial Committee are true heroes and patriots. But in addition, they are men whose undying love for and loyalty to their fallen comrades is now legendary and has not diminished in the slightest as it has stood the test of time and only seems to get stronger with each passing year.

So please join them once again this year as thousands have done for more than three decades on the Second Sunday of September, this coming Sunday, to pay tribute to and honor the memories of true American heroes, who gave all in defense of America's freedom and liberty. Let's continue to show these great men on the South Boston Vietnam Memorial Committee that we as a community will continue to stand with them in keeping alive the memory of those who have sacrificed so much for all of us. To once again quote that so often repeated message on the South Boston Vietnam Memorial: "If you forget my death, then I've died in vain".

Once again: This coming Sunday, September 10th -Memorial Mass, 10:30am, St. Brigid Church immediately followed by the rededication ceremonies at 11:30am, Medal of Honor Park at M Street.







#### **AFC**

## AFC East: New England Patriots (13-3)

-The reigning, defending Super Bowl champs will have to find a way to win without Julian Edelman on the offensive end, and without Rob Ninkovich on the defensive end. But with all due respect to those two veteran players, I don't think there's anyone out there who believes the Pats won't win the division without them. I'll take the Patriots to win 13 games, which will be the most in the AFC.

AFC North: Pittsburgh Steelers (11-5)
-Ben Roethlisberger teased us with a potential retirement after losing to the Patriots in the AFC Championship Game last year. But he's back for another season, and the Steelers will be good enough to win 11 games once again, and win a division that is anything but interesting heading into the 2017 season.

AFC South: Tennessee Titans (10-6)
-The 9-7 Titans just barely missed out on the playoffs last year, losing the "division record" tiebreaker to the 9-7 Houston Texans. Expect Marcus Mariota to have a big year, and lead Tennessee to a 10-win season and its first division title since 2008.

AFC West: Oakland Raiders (12-4)
-Derek Carr's injury late last season left everybody in the NFL wondering "what could have been" for Oakland. I expect the Raiders to be

just as good this season, and 12 wins for the second straight year should be good enough to take the AFC West crown.

## AFC Wild Cards: Kansas City Chiefs (11-5), Indianapolis Colts (9-7)

-Kansas City should be a bonafide No. 5 seed in the AFC, come playoff time. But the fact that I'm putting the Colts in the tournament just goes to show you how bad the conference is. Andrew Luck is still not healthy to begin the season, but if he does return at some point in the first few weeks, I'm not ruling out that they could put together a 9-7 season and win some type of tiebreaker to get in as the No. 6 seed. But let's be honest, that final wild card spot will most certainly be up for grabs.

#### **NFC**

#### NFC East: Philadelphia Eagles (10-6)

-As I write this, Ezekiel Elliott's six-game suspension has reportedly been upheld. So, functioning with the mindset that one of the best young running backs in the league will miss significant time, I'm officially declaring an open competition for the NFC East. And I do believe Eagles second-year quarterback Carson Wentz has an opportunity -- with a couple new offensive weapons -- to make that necessary second-year leap to get Philadelphia back to the playoffs for the first time since 2013. NFC North: Green Bay Packers (12-4)

-Not sure how you can bet against Green Bay here. The Packers have won the North five of the last six years. And with Aaron Rodgers coming off a 40-touchdown season in which he led his team to the NFC Championship, Green Bay has the third-best odds in Vegas to win the Super Bowl. If they can survive the first two weeks of the season against Seattle and Atlanta, then I don't see how the Packers don't win 12 games.

#### NFC South: Atlanta Falcons (13-3)

-There are some who believe that the Falcons' devastating loss to the Patriots in the Super Bowl will somehow linger into this season. It might have an effect on them, mentally, when they travel to New England in Week 7. But other than that, I think the Falcons will actually win more games than they did last year. Put them down for 13 wins and the No. 1 seed in the NFC.

### NFC West: Seattle Seahawks (11-5)

-The Seahawks took the West last year with just 10 wins. It marked the third time in the last four years that they won the division. Vegas gives them the second-best odds to win the Super Bowl. And with their schedule fairly favorable, I'm giving them 11 wins. Nobody wants to play in Seattle. And until that changes, I won't bet against the Seahawks to win this division.

## NFC Wild Cards: Arizona Cardinals (10-6), Carolina Panthers (10-6)

-These might be unpopular picks for

all the NFL experts out there. But I feel both teams are going to have serious bounce-back years. After advancing to the NFC Championship two years ago, Arizona finished with just seven wins last season. But their pass defense is still top-five in the NFL, so if Carson Palmer and David Johnson can stay healthy, the Cardinals should be able to get into the playoffs. And after losing in the Super Bowl two years ago, Carolina won just six games last season. There's no way Cam Newton doesn't figure things out in 2017.
